Splatter

At the risk of sounding like Captain Obvious, I thought I'd take a couple of minutes to share some observations and to paraphrase some of the tips of contesters worldwide.

It continues to amaze me how simple things come back to bite you when you least expect them.

Here is list of things to think about as you prepare for your participation in the upcoming contest:

- Make sure all of your software updates are installed and working at least a week before the contest. I heard of several stations that found bugs in the first hour of the contest. And then the real scramble starts!
- 2) Make sure all of your clocks are set well before the start of the contest.
- 3) If you are networking multiple computers for a multi-op effort, make sure to create cheat sheets for for the other operators. It's a bit disconcerting for the operator team to have to wake up everyone in a 5 mile radius during the 40 meter run to JA's to get the network unlocked!
- 4) I know we are all tempted to make last minute changes. But think of the impact of a major station layout change on Friday afternoon! Been there, done that and at midnight during the 80M shot into Europe you find that the beverage switch didn't get hooked up! ARRGGGHHH!!
- 5) Make sure that you have coordinated with your family. I thought I had and found that I had to cash all of my brownie points in because they "forgot" I was busy on Saturday and they had made plans for the family.
- 6) Try all of your antennas before the contest. It can be a challenge to start trying to test a new beverage during the first couple of hours of the contest while others are trying to keep runs going to JA's or Europe or where ever.
- 7) Try to get enough sleep before Friday. It is very hard to push for a 48 hour effort if you start tired.

- 8) If you decide to nap on Sunday morning, make sure that you set two or maybe even three alarm clocks. Keep at leas one if not two out of reach while you are laying down. It can really effect your score when you sleep through the 15M opening on Sunday morning!
- 9) Do a little preparation work. Find out what DXpeditions are available. Find out who is a true multi-band or single-band effort. Make a note to yourself of who is out there. It is easy to miss an easy multiplier if you think you have worked a C6 and only later find that you have him on 80, 40, 15 and 10 after the contest and you just passed him up on 20 at the end because you thought you already worked him. (This is even more important if you are working a multi-op effort.)
- 10) When the contest is over and your eyes are like glassy marbles and your brain feels like two day old oatmeal, don't try to dupe your log and get it ready for submittal! Make a duplicate disk of the files and shut everything off.
