EIDXA 's newest member - John Ely.



Member of ARRL, Central States VHF Society, QCWA, and OOTC. Worked for several employers including WOI radio, KHAK radio, E. F. Johnson Company, Collins Radio Company, and Ames Laboratory (USAEC). I also served three years as Business Manager of IBEW Local 1362 (July 1992 - July 1995). Worked for Collins twice, totaling over 30 years. Jobs included laboratory technician, production engineer, and test technician. My fondest memories of Collins are from the early '70's when I worked on Collins ham gear.

I recently retired after working eleven years for a small company that builds chiropractic tables.Much of my ham time is spent in my basement working on various low budget projects. All my antennas were in the attic until recently. I have 48 states confirmed and VUCC on six meters with those antennas. In the late fall of 2011 I put up an outside wire and can now operate effectively on the lower bands, including 160 meters.

My favorite activity is setting up and operating in ARRL Field Day. The picture below was taken three years ago at the Jones County ARC field day. WØGN is on the left operating with son John (still not licensed). Somehow the table for the camper was locked inside a shed with no key, so everything was set up in a "make do" configuration.

I have always believed in order and neatness. A workman is judged by the workspace he inhabits and electronic work is no different. Below is a picture of my workbench. Also below is one of my many innovative test areas. The unit being tested is a 100 Watt PA that was put together for my software defined radio station.Perhaps it will be working in time for the ARRL September VHF contest.



My only previous connection with EIDXA was in the late 1980's when I operated some packet nodes remotely located on a hill near Stone City. The equipment was housed in an old station wagon and eventually included a 220 mHz link to WB8ZRL's DX cluster at Ely, Iowa. In just a few years the Internet made that station unnecessary and I shut it down.

My first DXCC was CW #1572 and I finally managed to get a phone DXCC earlier this year.



#### Woodpecker Damage Follow-Up!

#### Friedrichshafen 2014 Tom Vinson NYØV

Many of us have traveled to the Dayton Hamvention. You have to do that at least once in your life as it is the "Mecca" of amateur radio. I usually travel with a group from the Radio Farm, NØMA, in Cedar Rapids. We joke that it's our "once in a lifetime annual trip to Dayton." But, Dayton isn't the only large hamfest in the world. There is of course,

Friedrichshafen "Ham Radio 2014" as the EU equivalent of our Dayton. While not as large as Dayton, if you are considering traveling to EU near the end of June sometime, you may want to consider swinging over to Friedrichshafen.

This summer I had that opportunity presented to me when I was asked to be the instructor of a course at Rockwell Collins- Heidelberg. Since that class was to end at noon on Friday the weekend of Freidrichshafen, it didn't take me long to figure out how to get to southern Germany for the hamfest! I emailed the Ham Radio 2014 (http://www.hamradio-friedrichshafen.de/hamen/) website contact for the brochure and then set up the train tickets through DB Bahn (http://www.bahn.de/i/view/USA/en/index.shtml) the EU rail pass system.

Friedrichshafen is a town of around 60,000 situated on the north side of Lake Constance (Bodensee) in the far south of Germany. If you wish to travel most directly to Friedrichshafen, I believe Zurich would be a great city to fly into and then take a train over to Friedrichshafen.

In the hotel I stayed at I met other hams from all over EU. I was going to take a city bus over to the exhibition hall(s) when I ended up having breakfast with fellow hams from near Munich. They had driven to Friedrichshafen and offered me a ride to the hamfest. Ham radio comradery is great, isn't it? My first impressions of the hamfest is that the facilities are excellent! If you have been to Dayton's Hara Arena you know how run down the facilities are there. The Friedrichshafen hamfest is totally opposite in facility quality.

The buildings are more akin to the Wright Patterson Air Force Museum in both the Quonset shape and quality.

This hamfest draws about 15,000 hams and the facilities easily accommodate this size of attendance. I never felt like it was "rear ends and elbows" like at Dayton.

The other thing that is nice about Friedrichshafen is the food and beer! Excellent German beer and (of course) the brats are hard to beat!

What interested me was not the usual ICOM, Yaesu, or Elecraft booths, but the unique EU companies and garage shop hams showing off their wares.

There were some pretty cool SDR radios and a lot of VHF/UHF modules and antennas. Along with these vendors were the individual country societies and clubs.

As I perused the exhibits I enjoyed meeting hams from Sweden, Slovenia, Romania etc. When I came upon the ARRL booth I ran into KØIR and WØAIH! Small world.

Needless to say when I am traveling in EU I don't buy too much to take back, though I did end up with a nice Palm Radio mini paddle and code cube set up. I also picked up Scott, KØMD's repaired MicroKeyer from MicroHam, topping off my carry-on computer bag for the flight home.
