Minutes of the EIDXA meting July 29, 2016


- 1. 31 hams answered the CQ call.
- 2. Meeting was called to order by Joe, K8OM at 7:30 PM




- 3. Introductions were made all around.

KDØQ Glen Thorne

I grew up in Oregon, Wisconsin and was first licensed in December 1965 as WN9QWW. Passed General exam at the Chicago FCC Field Office in August 1966 and became WA9QWW. Moved to Cedar Rapids and became WBØZTN in 1977. Passed my Extra exam in May 1980 and was assigned the call KDØQ.

Interest in radio started at age 10 with a homebrew crystal radio "Christmas break" project with my Grandfather who was an SWL in the 1920s. First short wave receiver was a Knight-Kit Star Roamer and 30 ft of hook-up wire in the attic. Became interested in Amateur Radio when visiting my uncle, W9HXM and learned the Morse Code in Boy Scouts. First station consisted of a pair of ARC-5 receivers for 40 & 80 meters, a rock bound Heathkit DX-60 and a fan dipole.

Was a member of the Four Lakes Amateur Radio Club in Madison, Wisconsin through high school, attended meetings at the old Wisconsin School of Electronics where I took classes for a general ticket, also participated in Fox Hunts and Field Day. Introduced to DXing at the shack of W9EEQ after club meetings. First DX thrill was hearing a UA9 at dawn on 80 meters from my own shack.

After high school, some college and military service, I landed in Cedar Rapids and ended up working as a draftsman at J-Tec Associates where I met WØEAN, WØIZ, and others. Joined EIDXA as an Associate Member in March 1979 and enjoyed many club activities including Sunday night net and DX spotting on 147.57, the wanted list and middle of the night one-ringers, and multi-op contesting at the QTHs of KØJSY and WØEJ.

A Mechanical Engineering degree from University of Iowa in 1979 started 25 years of career changes, moves, kids and not much ham radio activity. The last move was to my wife's family farm west of Traer and working from home as a Software Engineer. Now some time for DXing and room to grow antennas. Have since discovered RTTY and 160M DXing.

Current rig is an Elecraft K3 with an Elecraft KPA500 amplifier. Tower is an AN Wireless HD-80. Antennas are an M2 7&10-30LP8 LPDA at 82 ft, M2 6M7 Yagi at 92 ft, and a 265 ft OCF Inverted Vee at 75 ft. Receiving antenna is a 580 ft NE/SW reversible Beverage with another one pointed NW/SE under construction.

Amateur Radio interests besides DXing: Field Day, Storm Spotting, ARES – currently serving as Tama County EC. Clubs: EIDXA, Iowa Wireless Amateur Radio Network. Tama County Amateur Radio Society and Central Iowa Radio Amateur Society.



DXCC: Mixed Honor Roll 346/332, CW 334/325, Phone 333/322, RTTY 134, 9 Band DXCC, WAS: CW 160M.

Other interests besides grandkids and DXing: avid deer hunter and rabid Hawkeye Football fan.

EIDXA DX'ing Club Survey

At the July 29th club meeting, the results of the "EIDXA User Survey" were presented. That survey focused on EIDXA member's general background and DX operating interests.

Of the current 73 members of EIDXA, we had 43 members (59%) respond. Thank you for participating and I hope you had fun with the survey.



For those that weren't able to attend the July 29th meeting, here are the salient points of the results of that survey.

- The average age of those club members responding is 68 years ranging between 37 and 86 years old
- 49 years is the average total length of time our members have held an amateur radio license with a range between 10 and 69 years
- 43% of our members are currently on the DXCC Honor Roll
- Of those members on the DXCC Honor Roll, a whopping 67% are Top of the Honor Roll!
- 308 countries is the average number of countries (current and deleted) confirmed by our members
- 60% of our members are also working on the ARRL DX Challenge Award with an average of 1765 points (band slots)
- "Mixed DXCC" followed by "CW DXCC" and "Phone DXCC" are the most commonly held mainstream DX awards within EIDXA
- 52% of those responding prefer using the ionosphere to get their signal to where they want it to go in lieu of other propagation means such as satellites and moon bounce
- Approximately 25% of those responding have made at least one contact on the 60 meter amateur band with low interest due to no DXCC credit allowance
- 45% of our members use a single Yagi antenna and a few wire antennas to work DX thus proving it doesn't take enormous towers and antennas to be a successful DX operator (but those sure do make it more fun)
- SSB, CW and RTTY are the most popular emissions used by our members to work DX while the newer digital modes (PSK, JT65) are gaining in popularity
- LOTW (Log Book of the World) is quite popular with our club members in QSLing with 93% of us now using it
- IOTA (Islands on the Air) is of little interest to our club members with only 15% participating

This survey highlighted our need to bring new and younger members into our ranks. If you know a new or potential new ham that hasn't been bitten by the DX bug yet, please invite them to our next club meeting. Additionally, if you have implementable ideas on how to increase our ranks please let me know and we'll definitely pursue them Also, our members have unquestionably proven that moderate stations using a single Yagi antenna with wire antennas is more than sufficient to be quite successful in working lots of DX dispelling the myth that you have to be a "big gun" to slug it out in the pile ups.

If you have a subject that you would like covered in a future survey please let me know and I'll see about getting it done.

WWØE's DX'ploits

China to crackdown on unauthorised radio broadcasts

August 2016. In past six months, Chinese authorities have seized over 500 sets of equipment for making unauthorised radio broadcasts, and a total of 1,796 cases related to illegal radio stations were made.

Reportedly, in a national campaign aided by more than 30,000 airwave monitors, in over past six months, more than 500 sets of equipment for making unauthorised radio broadcasts were seized in China. The campaign, launched on February 15 by the State Council, resulted in 1,796 cases related to illegal radio stations, after 301,840 hours of monitoring from February to July, according to an online statement by the Ministry of Industry and Information Technology. The number of incidents was down



by 50 per cent from April to August, the China Daily quoted the statement as saying.

So-called pirate radios have appeared in most parts of China since 2015 and this "has been a channel for criminals to defraud and promote aphrodisiacs, along with counterfeit and poor-quality medicine", according to the Ministry of Public Security's Criminal Investigation Department. The operating cost of a pirate radio is low, but profit can be high. A pirate radio station that broadcasts advertisements for aphrodisiacs can pocket more than 70,000 yuan (\$10,500) a month, with an overhead cost of no more than 10,000 yuan, investigators said in a post on Sina Weibo. It said most spare parts for broadcasting equipment can be bought on the internet.



Marconi: The Man Who Networked the World by Marc Raoby.




A little over a century ago the world went wireless. Cables and all their limiting

inefficiencies gave way to a revolutionary means of transmitting news and information almost everywhere, instantaneously. CEØX, SAN FELIX (Update/2017 DXpedition Declared False). The following (translated) appears on the Radio Club de Chile (CE3AA) Web page at: http://www.ce3aa.cl/component/content/article/11629-isla-san-felix-dxpediton "On September 6, 2016, Radio Club of Chile, represented by its President Dr. Galdino Besomi, Vice President and Don Jose Tijoux, have held a meeting with Admiral Don Arturo Undurraga Contra Chief of the First Naval Zone, whose outcome can inform the Chilean amateur radio community and interested foreigners in the expedition to Isla San Felix that has been advertised in various DX news sites and and led by Mr. Felipe Gutierrez, CE5WQO, for which would have been extended authorization of landing on the island showing off documents that accredits:

- 1) That the Navy of Chile considers that such documents are false.
- 2) The Navy has initiated legal action in this regard.

It is therefore evident that the advertised DXpediton is false and that besides the alleged widespread authorization by SUBTEL for this purpose and circulating in different media it would also be false."
